


# A Guide to R.A.F. Tiree

By 1940 Atlantic conveys had assumed a crucial importance to the British war effort and it became vital to establish forward air bases along the west coast of Scotland.

The Reef on Tiree, site of an earlier civilian airstrip, was requisitioned by the Ministry of War. Contractors such as Tawse and Melville, Dundas and Whitson were brought in to construct an aerodrome and radar station.

In 1940, a workman's camp was set up in Crossapol and a radio hut with three masts was erected opposite the Scarinish police station. Radar screens complete with army checkpoints on the road were built in Upper Balinoe and on the Middleton machair. In April 1941 the 31<sup>st</sup> Embarkation Unit arrived and established their headquarters where MacLennan Motors have their garage today.

R. A. F. Tiree was formally opened in November 1941 as part of 15 Group, Coastal Command. Its work can be seen as having two phases.

In April 1942, 224 Squadron came, flying Hudsons on antisubmarine patrols and air sea rescue. Later the 304 (Polish) Squadron arrived flying Wellingtons. In July, 224 Squadron converted to Liberators, planes with a vastly superior range. In autumn of that same year this squadron was moved to southern England and the base was little used during the following twelve months.

But in September 1943, R.A.F. Tiree had a new lease of life as 518 Squadron moved to the island flying Halifaxes out to the Atlantic on weather reconnaissance duty. This was dangerous but vital work, and weather information from Tiree was widely used in planning offensives such as the D Day landings.

In February 1944, 281 Squadron flying Warwicks on air-sea rescue duties arrived to reinforce the station.

While the acrodrome was busy, the machair west of Beinn Hough was also developed as a powerful radar centre with several tall masts and semi-underground control rooms. There was also a radar screen on the hill itself, reached by a line of steps. To the east lay a support camp with its own N.A.A.F.I. and army guard quarters. Called 'Kilkenneth' by the R.A.F., it was actually in Hough and Balevullin. This radar cluster was an important part of the air defences along Scotland's west coast, and the forerunner of today's 'Golf Ball' on Beinn Hynish, run by the Civil Aviation Authority.

At the end of the war most of these buildings were pulled down and buried at the shore, as at Traigh Bhàigh. Crofters were allowed to relocate some of the huts at their own expense, and these can still be seen around the island.


Some wartime buildings remain and are used for storing cattle feed or to provide shelter for stock in winter. Most of the area we know as 'The Camp' in Crossapol was built after the war, as were the disused radar buildings on Beinn Gott and Balephetrish.

As we walk around the sites of R.A.F. Tiree, the foundations of which are now covered with beautiful machair flowers, we can sometimes feel the wartime ghosts. This guide helps us identify the sentry boxes, the latrines and the accommodation blocks of the base and takes us closer to the fears, the laughter, the bravery and the sheer boredom of wartime life.

Using maps collected by the late Danny Gillespie, An lodhlann, has put together this field guide. We hope you find it useful.


### Overview of Crossapol Sites


If you walk along Crossapol shore towards Baugh bridge, you will find a small burn, An Sruthan Ruadh, just after the buildings of The Island Centre. Recent erosion of the dunes at this point reveal the dumps where bulldozed remains of Sites 5, 6 & 7 were tipped after the war.

The main approach road shown on this map is the present day access road to the Tiree Motor Co. garage at Crossapol. (Building No. 18)




### Aerodrome Site Overview

The general aerodrome area is subdivided into seven distinct zones, some used for general operations and some for aircraft manoeuvring.

When viewing these maps please use the 'N'orth pointer arrow for orientation. Balephetrish Bay lies north of the aerodrome and Crossapol shore (Traigh Bhaigh) lies to the south.



The details shown are from original maps dated 1942. The present day area known as 'The Camp' was built after the war and therefore does not appear on these maps.



Section 'B' is at the Balephetrish end of the aerodrome. Aircraft could approach or depart directly across Balephetrish Bay. Recently this area of runway was re-opened by Highlands and Island Airports and is used by smaller aircraft in certain wind conditions. It is now known as the 'north' runway, and can be clearly seen from Kenovay.



Section 'C' is possibly the most inaccessible area of the present day airfield and lies facing Balephetrish Hill. The ground is very marshy and is prone to winter flooding.





Site R9 Section 'E' like Section 'D' lies roughly parallel with the roadway between Crossapol and Baugh, although nearer Crossapol. Again fenced by the present airfield perimeter fence line, this area is near the large circular installation opposite The Island Centre which has a series of orange colour aerials around its roof. This is a modern civil aviation directional beacon.





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

### Hough and Kilkenneth

Despite the fact that the R.A.F. decided to name this area 'Kilkenneth', the installations were actually in the townships of Hough and Balevullin.


We show the detailed maps of the area on the machair below Beinn Hough facing the sea, where tall radar and radio masts were erected. These masts were secured by massive concrete anchoring points which can still be seen dotted around the area. An excellent vantage point for the machair sites is from the top of Beinn Hough.




### Army Guard Site Kikenneth

The Army Guard Site was located just beyond the blue and white sign.





The foundations of this site can still be clearly seen from the road between Balevullin and Kilkenneth at Hough, on the right just after the Moss road junction.



### An Iodhlann

An Iodhlann (pronounced an yull-an) is Gaelic for the stackyard, the enclosed area behind the house where the harvest is stored. We have chosen this name for our collection to reflect Tirce's poetical name *Tir an Forna*, the Land of the Barley. We have 2,000 text items, 160 old maps, 105 audiotapes and 1800 photographs about the island.

## The Gaelic Partnership

Co-Roinn Ghàidhlig Thiriodh 's Cholla (the Tirce and Coll Gaelic Partnership) owns *An* Iodhlann and has researched and prepared this guidebook. The Partnership was set up in 1994 and is a Scottish Charity (No. SC022642).

Its aims are to encourage the use of the Gaelic language here and to develop an archive and museum of Tiree's history, archaeology, flora and fauna, geology and weather - in fact anything at all about the island and its people.

## Operational Costs

Tiree has a rich and fascinating history, but if it's not properly recorded, much of it will be lost to future generations. The Tiree and Coll Gaelic Partnership are striving to capture the island's past through this project, but we do need your help.
