Preface.

THE Island of Tiree measures only 12 miles at its greatest length, by 8 miles at its greatest breadth; but when the Call of Empire sounded throughout our shores in the fateful August of 1914, no place responded more enthusiastically than the little island nestling so snugly on the bosom of the wide Atlantic. From their island home, from the cities where they had started to carve out a place and name for themselves, and from many lands where they had departed to seek their fortunes, the sons of Tiree answered the call. With the Australians, New Zealanders and Canadians they came, but many will never more return to the countries of their adoption. In Flanders' mud, in Egypt's sand, and on Africa's veldt they sleep.

"Cha Till iad tuilleadh"—but their work is done; and we hold them evermore in proud and grateful memory.

Many of our Tiree lads were in the Merchant Service, and they deserve no less honourable a tribute than those who fought on the battlefield. Their foe was an insidious and nearly always invisible one, and every hour was fraught with danger, yet they carried on; and we are proud to say that at no time was Britain in sight of famine or even of great scarcity, thanks to our brave sailors.

The daughters of Tiree responded not less nobly than their men folk, employing every spare moment, every talent and opportunity in collecting funds for the Red Cross, in knitting comforts for the men on service, and in keeping the home fires burning till the boys would come back. Several hundred pounds in money were collected at various times for the Red Cross, besides gifts of fresh eggs for the wounded; gifts of tea, milk, butter, scones and cakes for the Canteen on the Pier at Gott. Many a tired war-worn hero, home for a much-needed leave to Tiree, or the Outer islands, blessed that canteen.

When the War Savings Campaign started, Tiree collected enough to purchase an Aeroplane, which was called the "Tirisdeach," and of which every Tiree man has right to be proud.

The Ladies' Guild of the Glasgow Tiree Association worked strenuously during the years of war to send comforts and parcels to Tiree men on service, and their Christmas Parcels alone cost upwards of a hundred pounds annually. In addition they entertained wounded soldiers from the Woodside and Oakbank Hospitals on several occasions, and these treats were greatly appreciated by the men.

We are proud of our island, and we are grateful to God for the issue of the most bloody campaign in history.

Seaman Lachlan M'Farlane, R.N.R., who died at Plymouth on 15th March, 1917, aged 19 years.

Private Charles MacDonald, 6th Seaforths, who was killed in action, 1918.

Lieut. Archd. D. Mackinnon, Machine Gun Corps, attached to 51st Division. He was killed at Cambria on 13th October, 1918. He was the second son of Mr. Donald Mackinnon, for so many years headmaster of Cornaig More School, Tiree. He was an exceptionally promising young man and an M. A. of Glasgow University. He had four brothers in the War, and it may be mentioned that his brother the Rev. N. D. Mackinnon joined up as a private very soon after the commencement of hostilities.

Gunner Duncan MacDonald, R.F.A., who was killed in action, September, 1916.

Seaman Archd. Brown, who died of influenza in North Africa in 1919.



Piper Hector Ross, Gordon Highlanders, who was killed in action in March, 1916.

Lieutenant William MacLean, A. & S. H., who was killed in action, 1918.



Pte John MacLeau, Camerons, who was killed at Loos, in September, 1915.



Sergeant Robert M'Callum, A. & S. H., was killed in action on 13th November, 1916.



Private Angus M'Callum, 7th Camerons, enlisted in November, 1914, and was killed by a sniper in March, 1916.



Trooper Wm. John Mackenzie, son of the late Mr. Duncan Mackenzie, Sheriff Clerk Depute of Oban and grandson of the late Rev. D. MacFarlane, Baugh, Tiree. He was posted as missing in the Dardanelles on 27th August, 1915, and was afterwards officially reported killed on that date. He was only 21 years of age and was mobilised from the very outbreak of hostilities.



Private Hector MacLean, Royal Scots, who went amissing, and was afterwards believed killed in July, 1916.

Private John MacDonald, A. & S. H., who was killed in action in May, 1917. He was the youngest son of Mr. Hector MacDonald, Coll View, Caolis, Tiree.



Private John MacLean, North Otago Infantry, who was killed on 4th August, 1915.



Gunner Archd. Livingstone, 5th Scottish Rifles, who died of wounds received in action at Passchendale, France, on 23rd February, 1918. He was only 21 years of age.



Private Alex. MacLean, A. & S. H., missing since 1917, and afterwards believed killed. He was the younger son of a widow, Mrs. MacLean, Gott, and his elder brother was drowned about the same time by the torpedoing of his ship.



Private C. T. G. Mackay, A. & S. H. who died in Military Hospital, Dundee, on 2nd August, 1917, of wounds received in action. He was the younger son of the Rev. D. T. MacKay, late of Scarnish, Tiree. He was only 22 years of age and had shown great promise as an Art Student, both in Oban High School and in the Glasgow Art College.



Private Archd. Colquhoun, Gordon Highlanders, who died of wounds received in action in France on 10th April, 1918, aged 23 years. His remains were interred in Lillers Communal Cemetery, France.

Captain Iain MacKinnon of the Cameron Highlanders of Canada, was a son of the late Mr. Archd. MacKinnon, Vault, Tiree. He was an M. A. of Glasgow University, and was studying for the ministry. He was conducting a Mission in Canada when war was declared, and joined the Canadian Camerons as 2nd Lieutenant in November, 1914. He came over with his regiment in June, 1915, went to France in February, 1916, was promoted Captain in April, and killed on 8th October.



Le-Corporal Colin MacLean, Glasgow Highlanders, attached 1st R. S. F., who died of wounds received in action on 12th May, 1918.



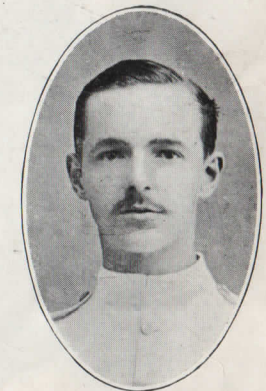
Private Blair MacDonald, 5th Cameron Highlanders, who died at Casualty Clearing Station of wounds received in action, 18th August, 1916. Age 21 years. Joined up, 22nd October, 1914.



Private Neil MacDonald, 16th H. L. I., who was killed in action on the Somme, 1st July, 1916. Age 24 years. Joined up, 23rd September, 1914.



Private Alex. C. MacDonald, 8th Seaforths, who was killed in action at Loos, 25th September, 1915. Age 18 years. Joined up 7th September, 1914.



Pte. Henry M'Cuaig Lamont, Royal Scots, who was killed in action on 26th August, 1914.

Private Hector A. L. M'Lean, H. L. I., who died in an English Hospital, having given a quantity of his blood to save a comrade's life. He himself, afterwards succumbed.

These all joined the same company of the Tramway Battalion early in the war and with the exception of Neil Mackinnon, were killed during the years 1916-17. Alexander Lamont, Chief Officer of the *s.s. St. Margaret*, was lost when his ship was torpedoed on 12th September, 1917.



Neil MacMillan, Chief Officer of the *s.s. Conningbie*, who was lost on 17th December, 1917, through the torpedoing of his ship by German submarine.



Donald MacDonald, who perished when the *s.s. Garmoyle* was torpedoed in the Irish Channel on 10th July, 1917.



Hugh MacLean who was lost when *H.M.T. Argyle* was torpedoed in February, 1917.



Duncan M'Lean, elder son of Mrs. M'Lean, Gott, who lost his life when his ship was torpedoed in 1917.



Alexander Campbell, who perished when the *s.s. Garmoyle* was torpedoed in the Irish Channel on 10th July, 1917.

Murdoch Sinclair, Quartermaster on *s.s. Ava*, the ship which so mysteriously disappeared in 1917, and was never heard of again.



Neil M'Donald, who lost his life on H.M.T. *Athenia* on 16th August, 1917.



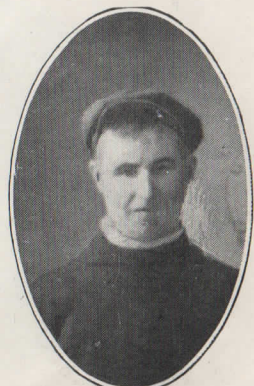
John M'Donald, Balephuil, Quartermaster on *s.s. Ava*, which mysteriously disappeared in 1917, and was never heard of again.



Allen MacFayden, *s.s. Bronzite*, was lost when his boat was torpedoed in 1916.



Jack Paterson, boatswain on the *s.s. Northumbria*, was lost on 9th January, 1919, when his ship was mined off the Northumberland Coast. He was 25 years of age.



Hector Cameron Brown was lost at sea on 28th October, 1916, through the sinking of the *s.s. Marina* by German submarine.

William M'Gibbon, Ship's Carpenter, H.M.T. *Viper*, was washed overboard on the night of March 3rd, 1915, when his ship was conveying German prisoners to the Isle of Man.



John Brown, Carpenter, was drowned on H.M.S. *Bagdale* in the English Channel on 1st May, 1917. Aged 27 years.



Lachlan M'Fadyen, Ship Carpenter, drowned 11th December, 1918, through the torpedoing of his ship, *s.s. Hare*.



John M'Millan, 3rd Officer, *s.s. Vienna*, was lost on 11th September, 1917, when his vessel was torpedoed by enemy submarine.



Seaman Archie MacArthur was lost when H.M.S. *Louvain* was torpedoed and sunk on 20th January, 1918.

Honours.



Lieut.-Commander John Carmichael, *s.s. Pebble*, who was mentioned in despatches at the Dardanelles landing for conspicuous coolness and bravery.



Lieut.-Commander Hugh MacKinnon, *s.s. Viceroy*, who died of dysentery in an English Hospital, after having gone through the severest part of the Dardanelles landing.



Lieut.-Commander Archibald Lamont, *s.s. Asteria*, who was awarded the D.S.O. at the Dardanelles landing. He died suddenly aboard his ship shortly after the Armistice was signed, on the eve of returning home on leave.

Archd. Brown, Balevullin Hector MacLean, Balimartine, John MacArthur, Balinoe, served through the Dardanelles campaign with Captains Lamont and Carmichael, but all had a miraculous escape.



Piper J. Sutherland, M.M., who was killed on 29th September, 1918.



Sergeant Hector MacDonald, N.Z. Forces, was awarded the Military Medal in 1917. He is a son of the late Hector MacDonald, Balephuill, Tiree.



Driver John MacLean R.F.A., was among the first to answer the "Call to Arms" in 1914, and was through the whole campaign. He was wounded several times and won the Military Medal in 1916.

Honours.



Captain Donald MacDonald, while in command of H.M.T. *Baron Polwarth* earned distinction for his gallantry and good seamanship on the occasion of an encounter between his vessel and an enemy submarine on 31st August, 1918.

The good look-out kept, prompt handling of the ship, and action taken, frustrated a torpedo attack. In recognition of his services on this occasion Captain MacDonald was commended in the "London Gazette," presented with Lloyds' Medal and received an award from both Ministry of Shipping and Lloyds.



Captain Neil Mackinnon, of James Currie's Steamship Company, Leith. His vessel was employed by the Government as a troopship and was on a voyage from Salonica to Alexandria when she was torpedoed by an enemy submarine. The crew took to the boats, but the vessel remaining afloat, Captain Mackinnon with a volunteer crew returned to his ship in the hope of saving her. After boarding the steamer, the submarine returned and fired another torpedo, sinking the vessel, after which Captain Mackinnon was never seen. In pursuance of His Majesty's Commands, Captain Mackinnon was commended by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty for zeal and devotion to duty and this commendation appeared in the "London Gazette," dated 21st June, 1918.



Seaman Donald A. MacLean, who was awarded the D.S.M. in April, 1917.



Seaman Donald A. Brown, H.M.S. *Haldon*, was awarded the D.S.M. for sinking a German submarine on the 11th January, 1917. He was only 19 years of age at the time. He is a son of Mr. George Brown, Balevullin, Tiree, and his brother, Hector Cameron Brown, was lost at sea on 28th October, 1916, through the sinking of the *s.s. Maria* by German submarine.



Sergeant A. L. MacDonald, Canadians, was awarded the Military Medal shortly before the cessation of hostilities in 1918.

Fte. Robert Thomson, 6th Camerons, was awarded the Military Medal in July, 1917, but we regret that we have not been able to get a photograph of him. He belongs to Caolis, Tiree.

Ladies on Service.

Miss N. C. MacLean, Unit Administrator, Q.M.A.A.C., 1917-1920.



Miss Annie MacGillivray, V.A.D., who joined up in July, 1916, and was on service till March, 1919. She spent upwards of two years in France, and was several times under fire. Her worst experience was at St. Omer on 30th August, 1917, when two wards of the hospital were smashed, patients, several orderlies, and four sisters being killed.



Miss Margaret C. Cameron, Q.M.A.A.C., 1917-1920. Served in France on Postal Staff for two years.

Miss Sarah MacIntyre, V.A.D., who faithfully served throughout the War, at stations, canteens and hospitals, and strenuously collected for the Red Cross, thus doing her bit in more ways than one.



Nurse J. MacArthur, who served for nearly three years in Townley Military Hospital, Nr. Bolton, England.
