Here I am in Babbacombe now. I don't half move around. This is a receiving centre for R.A.F. & I'm on a sort of Special Police job now. We should be moved again this week, so will you reply right away. We haven't been paid for 3 weeks now, & I'm flat broke, in debt in fact, (this is due to moving around), so will you send me £2 money order by return, please. I lost a few things in the fire & had to replace them, too.

This S.P. job is 2 hrs on & 4 off for 24 hrs, & then 24 hrs rest; it isn't so bad. I've fallen in with 4 Englishmen here, & am not running round with Scots, as usual. It's a change.

The grub here is not so good.

I've also just had 4 days janken (confinement to camp with fatigue) for not cleaning buttons one morning. I was fed up with it, but you're not a proper airman till you've had some. I got floor scrubbing, so did 7 others; you see we'd been allowed to do as we liked in one place, & were shifted to another hotel (H.2) where things were tight, & no slacking.

Here again we do pretty much as we please, off duty.

If you write Aunt Mary give her my regards

I don't have any more chance of going to Rhod, now. Too bad.

I met an old officer of mine down here. He was surprised to see me on b.B. said I'd been one of his best men, (to another bloke)

I'm enclosing an S.A. withdrawal form for the £2. Ask Gavin for some more forms & send them, will you?

When is Dad going to have an easy time again? I am sorry to hear he is still as hard worked as ever. He'll be wearing away to a shadow.

A few of my friends are posted tomorrow. That's why I'm sure I'm moving soon. Rumour has it, it may be Prestwick. I'm not sure if I want to come north until I get my strops back.

According to newspapers, wireless etc, the attack should be soon. I wonder if Hitler will hold off much longer.

I think I've given you all the news I know, & it's uncomfortable working on the beach, so good bye. (I'm on duty in 2 hours too.)
