OBITUARY

MR DONALD BROWN

One of the oldest and most highly respected residents of the Farnborough district, Mr Donald Brown, passed away at his home, The Main Camp, at the age of 82. Born on the island of Tiree, off the west coast of Scotland, the deceased migrated to Australia in 1886 and landed in Rockhampton. Walking to Yeppoon, he secured a job ploughing with bullocks for the Farnborough sugar mill and later took on a job hauling timber with a bullock team to a sawmill at Adelaide Park owned by the late Mr J. Atherton. Later, with the late Messrs D.

Anderson and Jack Burns, he took up a selection known as "The Main Camp," so called on account of drovers using it as a watering place. Eventually he bought out his two partners. He grew cane on his own account and on some occasions, with Kanaka labour, cut 1000 odd tons a year.

The late Mr Brown was married to Matilda Peterson on February 22, 1896, the late Rev. Alexander Hay performing the ceremony. In 1901 he was offered a job as over-seer for the Livingstone Shire Council and later was employed by the Rockhampton City Council. After leaving the council's service, he was recalled to supervise the grading of the oval at the Rockhampton Agricultural Society's show grounds. He was one of the prime movers in securing a school at Farnborough, a private one, the local fettlers building it themselves. The Government eventually took it over and built the present school. He was chairman of the State school committee for many years. He won numerous trophies at ploughing matches held at Alton Downs in the early days and was later, appointed judge of such events. He was a life member and also the oldest member of the Loyal Hope of Yeppoon Lodge (MUIOOF), and a life member of the Loyal Orange Lodge.

An outstanding personality, he will be greatly missed at his home, The Main Camp, which has always been noted for the hospitality extended to visitors. He is survived by his widow, three sons, Alex, Hector, and Hugh, two daughters, Misses . T. and A. Brown, and five grandchildren.

The funeral, which was largely attended, moved from his late residence. The service at the graveside was conducted by the Rev Robinson, of the Presbyterian Church.

OBITUARY

Dr. Charles Nicol Macquarie, who died at his home. Murray Bridge, on May 28, following a long illness that had for several years prevented him from conducting his practice. was born at Tiree (Scotland) on May 10, 1861. As a young man he occupied some years in travelling throughout India and Australia. Subsequently, he returned to his home land and, at the age of 30, graduated at the Royal College of Physicians (Edinburgh) and the Royal College of Surgeons (Glasgow). He returned to Australia and practised his profession both at Bright and Omeo (Victoria). It was in the latter town that he was married to Miss Annie Rogers in 1900. Dr. Macquarie and Mrs. Macquarie came to Murray Bridge in 1907, and the deceased had lived there continuously in the intervening years.

As a townsman, Dr. Macquarie was prominently associated with many public movements, and, until recent years, maintained active touch with them. He was a promoter and the original president of the golf club, a supporter of rowing and was at one time president of the local club. An enthusiastic member of the Show Society, he interested himself in the Flower Show Society, of which he was president continuously up to his retirement. He was a former member of race club committees, and was president in this department. He was also president of the bowling club. As a physician and surgeon he built up a large practice. The widow survives, and also one daughter. Miss Marion Macquarie. The only son.

Lieutenant C. C. Macquarie, who died in 1933, was a graduate of Duntroon Military College, and was attached to the Durham Light Infantry in India in 1926.
